## Tassie's alarming drug induced death rate

Australian Bureau of Statistics has revealed that Tasmania had the second highest drug induced death rate in Australia, at 9.4 deaths per 100,000 people (ABS Causes of Deaths, Australia, 2016).

What is even more alarming being that the greater Hobart region had the highest rate in the nation at 11.5 deaths per 100,000. The next highest rate in any region in Australia was Perth, WA at 9.8 deaths per 100,000 population.

Crime Stoppers Tasmania Chair, David Daniels said that 52 Tasmanians died as a direct result of drug use (excluding deaths resulting from tobacco or alcohol).

"This is not only very sad but a major concern with an average of one Tasmanian dying as a direct result of drugs every week", Mr Daniels said.

"To put this in perspective, drug induced deaths were even higher than road fatalities with 36 Tasmanian dying on our roads in 2016. What is most distressing is that drug induced deaths are avoidable", said Mr Daniels.

We can remove the supply of drugs and help save Tasmanian lives in our communities by informing on those dealing drugs.

Through the Dob in a Dealer Campaign, Crime Stoppers is calling on Tasmanians to report information about the manufacture and supply of drugs by reporting anything they know about drug-dealing offences.

"The last Dob in a Dealer campaign saw a fourfold increase in information reports received by Crime Stoppers Tasmania concerning drug related activity during the campaign in November 2018.

"It is our hope that this campaign might again provide Tasmanian Police with an even greater increase in information leading to a reduction in supply and thereby directly saving Tasmanian lives", said Mr Daniels.

"You don't need to have the complete story, just provide as much detail as you can. Even the smallest piece of information could provide value to a police investigation", Mr Daniels added.

It is important to note that the campaign is not about targeting users of illicit drugs. Crime Stoppers Tasmania asks that the community support those affected by drug use and encourage them to seek the appropriate professional help such as Family Drug Help, Youth Support and Advocacy Service, Salvation Army Bridge Centre, City Mission or Lifeline.

The Dob in a Dealer campaign is a nation-wide program funded by the Federal Government seeking to stop Australia's supply of illicit drugs such as methylamphetamine (ice), ecstasy and cannabis.
